Pre-School - Mrs Covill

General Overview

This term, we are learning about seasonal changes from autumn to winter and spring. We will celebrate the following special events: Chinese New Year, Mother's Day, Healthy Week, Science Week, World Book Day and Easter.

The Early Years Foundation Stage Curriculum is divided into seven areas of learning and our activities are planned to develop a range of skills within these areas of learning. The Prime Areas will be our focus during the settling in period for new children.

Prime Areas

Personal, Social and Emotional Development

In this area, the children will develop self-confidence, begin to manage their feelings and behaviour and build relationships with adults and peers. New children will be supported to settle, explore the activities, begin to make friends and develop some awareness of the rules and boundaries. They will gradually develop their independence as they become familiar with the routine and feel comfortable in their environment. Each day, we hold a 'Circle Time' when we play games with small groups of children and, through this, the children begin to gain confidence to speak in a group, maintain attention, wait for their turn and listen to others. For those children already established into this routine, we continue to play lots of games to engage and challenge the children. We would like every child to bring in a family photo; these are displayed to provide opportunities to ignite conversation between peers and adults.

Communication and Language

Through this area of the curriculum, we work towards building the children's ability to listen attentively, speak and develop their understanding. The children will begin to listen to and enjoy stories read to them, both in groups and one to one. We teach the children how to respect books and begin to make up a story using the pictures. We use books as a base for many topics, bringing the story alive with puppets and props and recalling the story through imaginary play. New words are explored through the core stories and, this term, we are going to introduce the 'Word of the Week.' We will display this on the front door so that you can support us in enriching your child's vocabulary.

Physical Development

The children's gross motor skills are enhanced through activities such as climbing, dancing, riding bikes and using building resources and balls. Their fine motor skills are developed through opportunities to use tools, such as scissors, and through their enjoyment of painting, drawing, collaging and using malleable materials. We support the children to manage their personal hygiene independently. Please help us by teaching your child how to wipe their nose and dispose of the tissue, to wash their hands (remembering to rub well with soap) and to put on their coat, hat, scarf and mittens independently.

Specific Areas

<u>Mathematics</u>, <u>Understanding the World</u>, <u>Literacy and Expressive Arts and Design</u>

The children have the opportunity to take home a Pre-School book every day for you to share with them. To expand on this, you can encourage your child to anticipate what might happen next, recall familiar parts of the story and join in with words and repetitive phrases. Older children may begin to recognise and name some familiar letters. We begin our 'Letters and Sounds' activities this term and will keep you informed of the progress your child is making and how you can further support them at home. The 'Sound of the Week' will be displayed on the front door after half term. Your child can bring in one small item beginning with the 'Sound of the Week.'

'Wow!' Board

We welcome contributions to our 'Wow!' board from time to time; this could be bringing in something your child has achieved at home so we can celebrate with them or it may be a picture they have drawn, a photograph of an experience they have enjoyed or something they have recently accomplished such as learning to ride their bike or being awarded a certificate.
